

## Instructions for Authors

### Aims and Scope

**Croatian Political Science Review** is the international edition of *Politička misao*, the leading academic journal in the area of political studies in Croatia. It is published once a year, as the fifth issue of *Politička misao*. The primary focus of the journal is on the topics related to Croatian and wider European studies. The editors of **Croatian Political Science Review** welcome articles on all aspects of political studies related to the area of its main focus, including: political history, ideologies, institutions and structure, processes of Europeanisation and European enlargement, communism and post-communism, identity and culture, conflicts and post-conflict reconciliation, transition and consolidation of democracy, international relations and media studies. We particularly welcome articles with focus on area studies in contemporary or historical perspective, such as: Yugoslav and post-Yugoslav studies, Ottoman and Balkan studies, studies of communist and post-communist Europe, East-Central European and Mediterranean studies. Articles in other areas will also be considered.

### Submissions

Articles submitted for publication should be submitted by email to the address: [politicka.misao@net.hr](mailto:politicka.misao@net.hr), or to the Editor, Professor Dejan Jović at: [dejan.jovic@fpzg.hr](mailto:dejan.jovic@fpzg.hr). Submissions should include an abstract of approximately 200 words and five key words. Papers submitted for consideration by **Croatian Political Science Review** must be unpublished and not considered for publication elsewhere. The journal welcomes only well-formulated and original scholarly work. Please use a clear readable style and define technical terms or acronyms when first used. Non-racist, non-sexist language is required, as well as plurals rather than he/she. Use UK or US spellings with '-ize' spellings as given in the Oxford English Dictionary (e.g. maximize). Single quotation marks are preferred, with double quotes inside single quotes. Dates should be presented in the form 1 January 2000. Abbreviations, contractions or acronyms should be used without points (e.g. Dr). All line diagrams and photographs should be termed 'Figures', should be referred to as such and should be numbered

consecutively. Authors are responsible for obtaining permissions from copyright holders for reproducing any illustrations, tables or figures.

## Manuscripts

*Articles* should normally be between 6000 and 10000 words in length. *Review Articles* should be between 4000 and 5000 words and *Book Reviews* 800 to 1000 words. The journal is published in English, in which language contributions should normally be submitted. All articles, including commissioned ones, will be subject to a double blind review. Please send manuscripts by e-mail. Where possible, please use Word or a file readable through Word. All manuscripts should be typed, double spaced throughout. Wide margins should be left on all sides. Pages should be numbered consecutively on the right-hand corner of the page. Details should be given of affiliations, full postal and email addresses, as well as telephone and fax numbers.

## References

The journal uses Harvard referencing; any notes should be placed at the end of the article before the references. Citations in the text should be given the author's surname, year of publication and pagination where appropriate; for example 'Giddens et al. (2003) have focused on...' or 'There have been many good examples of foreign-policy successes (Hill, 2001: 3-4). All references listed should be listed in alphabetical order at the end of the manuscript in the following forms:
