Submission to this journal proceeds totally online. [Log in](#) or [register](#) to submit your manuscript or review the progress of your submission.

As of December 2025, access to the submission system is available exclusively via ORCID or eduGAIN.

- ORCID is recommended for all authors and can be created in under a minute.
- eduGAIN is an international academic login system that allows researchers from universities worldwide to sign in using their institutional credentials.

Important: After registering via ORCID or eduGAIN and accessing the Open Journal Systems (OJS) platform, please open your profile and make sure to select the role of Author for the journal Public Sector Economics. Without selecting this role, you will not be able to start a new submission.

Unless otherwise indicated, the author who submitted the manuscript for publication will be considered the corresponding author and will manage all communication and correspondence with *PSE*.

Quick submission preparation checklist

To speed up the submission process, please follow this checklist:

- The submission contains original unpublished work and is not being submitted for publication elsewhere
- The manuscript is written in English as a Microsoft Word document
- The manuscript does not exceed 9,000 words, including references, tables, and graphs
- All tables must be submitted in an editable format, such as Microsoft Word or Excel, not as an image file (e.g., .jpg or .png).
- All graphs must be submitted in editable formats, not as image files (e.g., .jpg or .png) to allow final formatting and ensure high-quality production. Acceptable formats include Microsoft Excel, .eps or .ai files.
- Two versions of the manuscript are submitted – one with author details, and the other anonymised (including in the file's "Properties" – please check in the "File" menu (Info → Inspect document)).
- All authors have contributed to the research and preparation of the manuscript, and all have approved the submitted version
- Prior review all authors have disclosed external financing sources and any conflict of interest

- Posting online an early version of the manuscript - such as a working or occasional paper or other preliminary draft - before *PSE* peer review is not considered prior publication, but prior review authors have disclosed where it is available
- The authors understand and accept the terms of the **PSE ethical guidelines**. In particular, the authors guarantee that the paper does not violate any copyright rules and that ethical and professional standards for the publication of scientific papers have been followed. The publisher will not be held legally responsible should there be any claims for compensation arising from the publication of your work
- The authors understand that manuscript will be processed by industry-standard software to check for potential instances of plagiarism and use of generative AI or AI-assisted tools
- If generative AI or AI-assisted tools were used in preparing the manuscript, a statement entitled Declaration of generative AI and AI-assisted technologies in the writing process must be included in the manuscript at the time of submission, placed immediately above the references. The statement should specify the tool used and its purpose, and the authors must confirm they reviewed and edited any AI-generated content and take full responsibility for the final manuscript.

Text preparation

Please submit your manuscripts in Microsoft Word (.docx or .doc) format, using Times New Roman, font size 12, line spacing 1.5. Equations and tables can be written in font size 10. Total length should not exceed 9,000 words, including graphs, tables, footnotes and references.

The first page should contain:

- Title
- Authors' details – full names, affiliations, emails and **ORCID identifiers**. All authors are required to provide their institutional affiliation. Authors who are not affiliated with an institution should be clearly identified as independent researchers. The names and email addresses will be used exclusively for processing the submissions and will not be shared outside the Editorial Board
- Abstract (max 150 words)
- **JEL classification codes**
- Up to six keywords
- **Disclosure statements on financing and conflict of interest.**

If generative AI or AI-assisted tools were used in preparing the manuscript, a statement entitled *Declaration of generative AI and AI-assisted technologies in the writing process* must be included in the manuscript at the time of submission, placed immediately above the references.

References should be cited according to the **Harvard Style of Referencing**. The number of references in each manuscript is limited to 40. Review articles are exempt from this limit. Please ensure that your reference list adheres to this restriction, including only the most relevant and preferably recent sources that support your research.

Please use consistently the British ("-ise") spelling style throughout your manuscript.

When revising your manuscript for resubmission, please follow our **publication template**, which is mandatory if the paper is accepted for publication.

When submitting book reviews, please choose the option 'Manuscript – with author details'. A typical book review should be no longer than 1,500 words.

Review process

The submissions are first evaluated by the Editor-in-Chief and at least one Editor. They can reject the submission without sending it to reviewers if they determine that the paper is unlikely to be

published. The authors are normally informed within two weeks about the standing of their submission: editorial rejection or initiation of the peer-reviewing process.

All manuscripts that pass the initial editorial review are processed with the aid of standard plagiarism checking software. Those that satisfy the criteria of originality are subsequently sent for double-blind peer review.

The Editors send the manuscript to at least two external reviewers in anonymised form. All primary research articles undergo **double-blind external peer review**. The reviewers normally return their reports within four weeks. The Editors review their reports and inform the corresponding author whether the paper is rejected or needs to be revised and resubmitted.

The revised-and-resubmitted manuscripts are sent back to reviewers for follow-up recommendations, which are normally returned within two weeks. Several rounds of review and revision may be required.

Upon the receipt of follow-up recommendations, the Editors make the final decision whether to publish the paper. They may ask the authors to make additional changes before the paper is published.

Data policy

Authors of accepted papers that contain empirical work, simulations, or experimental work should be prepared to provide, prior to acceptance, information about the data, codes, and other details of the computations sufficient to permit replication, as well as information about access to data and codes. Authors are expected to preserve data and codes for at least five years following publication, and to offer reasonable assistance to requests for clarification and replication.

In empirical studies based on interviews, surveys, experiments, and similar methods involving human subjects, the authors are responsible for ensuring that legal rights of survey participants in each jurisdiction have been fully respected. These rights include but are not limited to: the right to informed consent to participate in and publish the results of the study; the right of participants to anonymity; and the right to confidentiality of personal and other identifiable information gathered as part of the study.

Authors are requested to disclose at the time of submission:

- all **sources of financial support** for the particular research described in their submission, including grants and other institutional and private funding;
- any **financial or other potential conflicts of interest** that might be perceived as influencing the results or interpretation of the analysis.
