

Instructions for references

- References should be listed by authors' names and chronologically (latest on the top) when the same author is represented several times.
- Citation in references should be written as follows:
 - ▶ Lacković - Grgin, K. (2006). *Psihologija adolescencije*. Jastrebarsko: Naklada Slap.
 - ▶ Jašarević, T. & Leutar, Z. (2010). Self-Perception of the Social Status of Disabled Ex-soldiers (Invalids) from the Croatian Homeland War. *Journal For General Social Issues*, 19 (1-2), 93-116.
- Sources in the text should be cited so that the interpreted text can, but does not have to, contain the author's name; at the end of the interpretation, after the author's name, the year of published work in brackets should be placed. When quoting literally, in direct speech the author's name, year of publishing of work, from which the quotation was taken and the page number where it is located should be written in brackets. When there are up to three authors, all the names should be listed in the brackets and the years of publishing of the works. If there are more than three authors only the first one is listed followed by "et al.". If the thought of an author is cited according to another author's citation, the name of the original author and the year is written in brackets, and separated by comma after name of the author who quoted and the year of publishing of his work. A complete quotation of sources should be provided.
- Notes, "footnotes" are used for additional explanations related to the subject content. They are not used to quote the source.
- When quoting from the Internet the following elements should be specified: 1. authors name (if known), 2. Complete document title in quotation marks, 3. Title of the work (if any) in italics, 4. The date of publication and last alterations, 5. full address inside brackets, 6. date of visiting the webpage in parenthesis .
